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### **LEADS FAMILY MEETING**




LEADS and the Alzheimer's

### Wall of Grass Honors Stu Kimball



Stu Kimball, a fixture of Boston's music scene and a 15-year veteran of Bob Dylan's touring and recording band, was the featured guest artist with local folkrock collective Wall of Grass at a fundraiser for the MGH FTD Unit on Thursday, June 27th, at the Boston Harbor Distillery. During the concert, Stu collaborated with Dr. Brad Dickerson, the director of the MGH FTD Unit and world-renowned neuroscientist in the field of Alzheimer's and related dementias, in a moving rendition of the Dylan classic "Forever Young." The concert was sold out and, due to overwhelming demand, a livestream option was added to allow engagement from around the world. A recording of the event is now available to watch on the MGH FTD Unit's YouTube channel.

Stu's commitment to the MGH FTD Unit is not just musical. After his diagnosis with young-onset Alzheimer's Disease in 2020, he became part of the Unit's ongoing research program. Stu hopes

the research he is part of can provide insight for the treatment of others, explains Michelle Kimball, his wife. "Early detection is extremely important. It can mean months or years of a higher quality of life for people who are sick and for their loved ones."

### Miles for Mike

Mike Gordon was a kind, genuine and compassionate gentleman who was always there to offer help to anyone, especially his children, siblings and friends. A hard working man during the week, Mike turned to leisure on his days off and weekends. He enjoyed snowmobiling, boating, walking, fishing, traveling, dining out and taking quiet Sunday drives to nowhere in particular with his beloved wife, Shirley. He passed away in June 2020, having lived with FTD for fourteen years. Like many caregivers, Shirley wanted to give back to the community that had assisted her and Mike's journey with FTD and launched Miles for Mike in 2021. This virtual walk raises awareness of FTD and funds for the MGH FTD Unit and occurs in late July each year to celebrate Mike's birthday.

The fourth annual Miles for Mike was celebrated on July 28th this year. Since its founding, Miles for Mike has raised over \$26,000 for the clinical research and care efforts of the MGH FTD Unit. Dr. Brad Dickerson, director of the unit, shares that "efforts to raise funds through Miles for Mike are invaluable. As a rare disease, the field of Frontotemporal Dementia needs people like Shirley who are committed to raising awareness and philanthropy. Thanks for the incredible work!"

# The MGH FTD Unit at the Alzheimer's Association International Conference


